"But I say to you, Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you," (Matthew 5:44, ESV)

Review the Sermon

How should Jesus' command to "be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect" motivate you toward spiritual growth and obedience?

How could you be more intentional this week about praying for those who have hurt you?

What changes need to be made in your heart and mind to free you to boldly love your enemies?
